


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## **HURTEAU MILLER COTTAGE**

Surrounded by dense forest, this extensively glazed red cedar-clad home is eye-catching and unique. Designed for a couple with a young son, it has been created as a space that will transition from a congregation space for a large extended family to a permanent family residence in the next decade.

The immediate use for this property is as a sort of 'camp' for a large family community spanning generations and including a considerable amount of dogs. The home was to serve as a family vacation retreat for about ten years, with a view to eventually making it the main family home. The spatial arrangement of the house was designed with this in mind, allowing for a range of differently aged occupants to comfortably pursue a variety of activities between a series of public and private spaces.

The house plan is stretched so that well zoned spaces are easily achieved. Boisterous, loud group activites can be pursued alongside solitary, quiet pastimes without interfering with one another. With visiting family members of a variety of ages from the very young to the elderly, this was an immediate concern. It further suits the house's future use as a private residence for a family with a teenage boy.

The form of the building is unique and eye-catching, and serves to create a warm and inviting indoor space. The upper floor, which houses all the private guest bedrooms, has been treated as an independent volume pushed into the lower part of the house. Hence the circulation at the perimeter of the lower public volume has high ceilings, whereas the middle area, beneath the lowered bedroom volume is more intimate, with lower ceilings. Three primary materials link the façade with the interior of the home; cedar, glass and terrazzo. The wood is a warm, grounding element of the design offset by the sharp, crisp glass. The terrazzo floors are a radiant but durable option, and the resulting cozy, casual interior requires almost zero maintenance even under the paws and feet of rambunctious animals and children.

The house connects family members in public spaces such as the dining room and living area, but equally, allows each member to exist as an individual left to his or her own interests and activities. Though the design is deliberately segmented to cater to a range of competing interests and needs, the home is clearly connected and forms a single, inviting architectural entity.




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














# FRESHWATER HOUSE

This friendly and playful design takes the image of a wooden crate tossed upon oceanside rocks to provide a sheltering cave below. Joyfully embracing the beautiful location, this is a house that reflects the robust and knockabout character of Freshwater Beach, with the special qualities of exposure and protection expressed in the headland cliffs and protected corners of the beachside site.

From the street, elegant rectangles in timber-framed glass set the tone of the design, with supporting notes of exposed concrete and copper. The effect is raw, open and inviting, suggesting that this is not simply a house, but a home; somewhere to come back to after a long day at the beach that is equal parts practical and warmly inviting. Materially, the home is designed as a simple backdrop; a quiet canvas to be coloured by the family's activities. The robust components were carefully selected and detailed to weather gracefully with only minimal regular maintenance - a central concern for such an exposed property.

Inside, layered and complex finishes are contrasted by a palette of raw materials to create a relaxed family environment. The concrete and hardwood structural elements are offset with more refined finishes, such as terrazzo, stucco and timber veneers in Oregon and Ebony, which juxtapose the translucent resin materials.

The internal organisation of the home is based around the family's desire for both privacy and togetherness. Bedrooms are discrete and separate, each with their own outlooks, while communal spaces are elevated platforms from which the family can enjoy the views without engaging in the beachside bustle. The interior represents an open ended and flexible design: as the children grow, their privacy and independence is supported by the separation and independent settings of their bedrooms.

The central level holds the internal common rooms. One such space is the large entertaining area, comprising both the living and dining rooms, with high ceilings and a glazed façade that slides back and opens directly to the beachside vistas. The kitchen and guest accommodation are grouped together on the sheltered northern side of the home, protected by sliding and adjustable screens and awnings.


The casual and relaxed appeal of this design belies the practical allocation of its spaces, as well as the careful framing of the beautiful outside views. Beachside functionality and a strong, open connection to the outdoors are balanced by carefully allocated private rooms, thus ensuring that the dwelling will remain a comfortable and flexible home, one that will age gracefully and stand the test of time.


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

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









THIRD FLOOR





# 22 OEI TIONG HAM PARK

This magnificent home responds to the needs of a family of five and resolves the client's specific requirements in a beautifully articulated linear design. Carefully separating communal living areas with more private spaces, the home offers individual spaces for every member of the family and protection from neighbouring homes.

On the lower floor, a spacious living room concludes the central corridor. The study, an extension of the master suite, overlooks this space and provides a strong connection between the levels. Located strategically to capitalize on good views, this space has the flexibility to be semi-open or fully enclosed, offering a private sanctuary behind motorized wooden screens.

A detached annexe houses two of the children's bedrooms, providing privacy and independence for growing children but maintaining a close proximity to the family unit. This space also houses the guest room on the lower level, and a family room tucked into the upper corner serves as a junction between the parent's room and the detached space.

The courtyard between blocks provides an intimate entertainment area for family and friends to socialize and relax by the side of the infinity lap pool. The entire ground floor space is interconnected, encouraging such interactions. The lap pool evolves into a water feature which weaves itself into the building volume, providing a beautiful link between spaces.

Natural textures like stone and timber are key in forming a strong grounding palette for the home, but a range of textures, lines and colours are carefully juxtaposed, providing timeless and harmonious appeal throughout the home. Glass enclosed bridges connect the living zones, blurring the boundaries between internal spaces and the landscape and engaging the surrounding scenery. This is enhanced by the large pivoting screen that shields the living room, offering privacy or connection at the client's discretion.





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

## **WESTERN PORT BAY RESIDENCE**

This understated family retreat overlooking Phillip Island in coastal Victoria is a simple design gesture with a very limited palette ideally situated to take advantage of views, ocean breezes and winter sun. Replacing a poorly positioned 1980s property, the new home is considered, spacious and subtly attractive, blending naturally with the site.

The entry to the home is defined by a subtle red handled front door, a dramatic design note which provides contrast to the subdued materials of the rest of the home. This formal approach is one of three entrances to the house. The house can also be accessed through the laundry to avoid muddy footprints and wet paw prints in the main area of the house, and through the garage during wet weather.

Constrained by a height limit, the roof is an eye-catching and sleek inclusion that makes the most of the restrictions. The origami-like roofline is a continuous folding form, generating folded ceilings for the interior that create spatial variation and tuck down to deeply recessed windows. The home rests comfortably on the block, spreading out a series of lazy decks that meander into the meadow and look out to sea.

The home is designed to provide a comfortable transition between indoor and outdoor living according to season and time of day. The house folds around existing trees, bending to allow for a north deck concealed from coastal wind. A deck to the east celebrates the morning sun, and a protected verandah to the west is a perfect winter retreat. Large glazed doors provide access to these spaces, and connect them to the house even when they're not in use.

The home is flexible, accommodating three generations of family. The plan is zoned to allow separation for sound and environmental control, and the kitchen has a large pantry, a larder and storage areas for gatherings in holiday seasons. All services, including air conditioning, heating and hot water, are capable of being zoned according to levels of occupation. All windows are double glazed, with remote controlled blinds in the living areas.

The interiors are calm and practical. Timber floors, off-white walls, stone benches and tiles are durable, attractive finishes that will stand the test of time and the test of pets and children. Inviting, restrained and aesthetically appealing, this house takes full advantage of the site with a view to year round use and a sense of family unity.





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












## MOOLOOLABA HOUSE

This refreshing canal-side property takes advantage of a north-eastern orientation and views of the water with an unassuming but attractive design. Externally, the home is light and approachable. Internally, cleverly zoned spaces ensure comfort for a large family.

The external form of the home is determined by a single circulation spine that runs the entire length of the dwelling, and is further articulated by lightweight bedroom boxes that serve as support for popped roofs and glass walls. This somewhat unusual formal exercise is a detailed exploration of the hierarchy of spaces implied by the external form of the home. Symmetry in form, derived from the rigorous planning phase, helped greatly in successfully executing this aesthetic.

F.C. Weatherboard cladding painted white is a reflective surface that provides the home with the natural coastal aesthetic it embodies. The fresh, natural, stripped back aesthetic is continued inside. Timber floors and crisp white paint provide an unassuming backdrop against which the ambient natural light reflects and the canal views star.

The singular spine from which all the living spaces extend links the street entrance to the canal, positioning it in such a manner that there is no interruption to specific zones or designated areas in between. Clerestory glazing provides abundant natural light to the living, dining and kitchen zones. All the living zones are carefully arranged around a swimming pool and entry colonnade.

The home is carefully organized to provide discrete and connected spaces, distinguishing definitely between the varying rooms. The plan and form of the home divide it into a cluster of three clearly pronounced zones; there is a children's wing, the communal living quarters, and a parent's retreat. Public and private bathrooms complete the formal symmetry and complement each zone.

The true success of this home is the absense or need for air conditioning. Ceilings and voids are high and, coupled with clerestory louvres, achieve an internal volume that creates a stack effect, moving air through all areas of the home. The circulation spine assists the natural ventilation paths throughout the house, including drawing cool breezes across the pool through the living spaces and back out to the canal.

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
























## **SPRING ROAD**

Designed by Lubelso, this contemporary four-bedroom family home is refined and bold. Slender and elegant from the front, minimal blades across the first floor create an immediate street presence and a heightened sense of arrival. Inside, the handsome space boasts a series of expansive independent living zones, ideal for the flow of family life.

This contemporary home is a 490m2 two-storey residence perfect for a family. Three integrated living zones, four bedrooms, a study and an outdoor entertainment area under a cantilevered roof have all been designed and built with considerable attention to detail and provide a range of alternately private and public spaces in which a family can comfortably exist.

Inside, a well considered spatial progression from the full height oak paneled front door to the rear outdoor entertainment area naturally connects the space. Three metre full-height double glazed windows ensure wonderful cross-ventilation is afforded from the elegant courtyards each side of the house.

Entertaining is delightful both inside and out, and the transition between the two spaces is natural. The lower level features a fully appointed kitchen with top of the range European appliances blending seamlessly into the satin finish cabinetry. American Oak veneer and Corian bench tops provide continued thematic warmth that recurs throughout the lower floor. The gas fireplace sits against a distinctive and expansive concrete hearth, providing an ideal place for a quiet chat and a glass of wine. Sliding glass doors provide visual access to the inviting outdoor space.

Full height solid pivot doors to the master bedroom conceal a more private retreat, perfect for parents to take some time off. A skylight that spans the full width of the bathroom highlights the sculptural presence of the freestanding bath in the en suite, allowing natural light to wash down the walls and into the bath and shower.

Luxurious and generous without melodrama, the elegance and attention to detail exhibited in the realization of this family home has resulted in a subtle, yet stylish space. Livable and modern, there is an understated opulence that lifts this design above the ordinary.

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










## **BROADWAY TERRACE HOUSE**

Located on a heavily wooded site on the Oakland Hills Ridge overlooking San Francisco Bay, this contemporary four-bedroom home is designed to grow and adapt with the clients and their children.

The stunning views of downtown San Francisco, the Golden Gate Bridge and Mount Tamalpais had to be the focus of any construction on the site. In addition, the interaction between the site and the home was well considered during the planning stage. To accomplish these objectives, the house is designed as three discrete structures that embrace the central knoll of the property in an 'L' structure.

The procession between these three structures is a journey from darkness to light, from limited views to wide vistas, and from compressed space to expansive volume. This succession of spaces is a reminder to the owners and visitors of the dynamic qualities of the site, with each structure intended for a distinct use. The first structure encountered upon approaching the home is the entry pavilion. Squeezed between the other two structures, this area is dark and cool, recessed into the knoll and surrounded by plantings.


The second structure is the living room pavilion. Filled with natural daylight, this is the most formal and ceremonial area of the three and is set apart and rotated slightly from the other two, aligning the aspect with Mount Tamalpais as a way to convey its ceremonial role in the homeowner's life. The final structure, which is by far the largest, contains all the rooms and spaces required for every day living, and has a strong connection to the terrace and the views.

A strong connection to the yard was a key consideration, so that children can come and go as they please but still be under the parent's watchful eye. Two bedrooms located on the lowest floor of the home was also important, placed for when the children become teenagers and transitional spaces are necessary.

With environmental considerations also accounted for, many sustainable features have been closely integrated into the architecture. The three discrete buildings that comprise the home each create distinct thermal zones and can be shut down independent of one another. The house is also designed to take advantage of afternoon breezes for ventilation, while large openings between floors allow easy passage for cooling breezes and for warm air to escape easily by natural means. Large cantilevered trellises and eaves protect the home from passive solar gain and provide shelter for more sensitive plants.

The exterior materials were selected to highlight the special qualities of the Bay Area, such as rough boards and rough stucco, which have a beautiful and rich appearance in the daylight. Overall this home is stunning, unique, and ideal for family living; a comfortable dwelling that will grow as the owners do.





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

#### POINT RICHMOND HOUSE

This elegant, modern home captures the magic of living in the San Francisco Bay Area. Constructed on a pier over the water, the home gently suggests the curved forms of ship's hulls, seashells, and the bodies of fish.

The four bedroom dwelling was built with a view to facilitate the active life of the owner's family, the strong relationship they have with the water and their love of boating and fishing. The location also demanded a home that would be durable against the effects of a salty environment, with exterior materials that would age gracefully and require minimal upkeep. Corrugated copper siding with verdigris was thus chosen, as it fulfils all three of these requirements. In addition, the wood siding was specified to be rough-surfaced so as to absorb more wood stain, protecting the wood for longer periods.

The home caters diligently to the lifestyle of the family. The expansive outdoor area, built above the water, provides a play area for the children as well as a small pool. A ramp located here allows access to the floating dock, where small watercraft and the family boats are moored.

The interior, meanwhile, is defined by extensive glazing, unlocking incredible views of downtown San Francisco, the Golden Gate Bridge and the water. The double-height living room and mezzanine open up through stacked sliding doors to the expansive deck and balcony for integrated indoor and outdoor living. Glazed corners allow the water views into every section of the home, flooding the interior with light and completing the connection between the home and the bay.

Additionally, the house's indoor spaces are designed to encourage family interaction. The mezzanine bears the piano, allowing music to drift through the home when the children are practicing, while the family room houses a pool table and a games table. Adjacent to this is a dedicated playroom for the children, which can be converted into a fifth bedroom if needed. Upstairs, a home theatre provides a comfortable entertainment space.

A number of sustainable strategies informed the design, reducing energy use and environmental impact. Powder-coated aluminium trellises shade the house from the sun above all south-facing windows, while light-green tinted glass reduces solar gain. The roof, painted white, further reduces conductive heat from the sun. In a sophisticated technological move, the design also employs computer-operated window shades, which are activated automatically whether the owner is present or not.

Resplendent in its bold, grey colouring against the beautiful backdrop of San Francisco Bay, this handsome home is built on strong connections between the water, the city, and the family.





# MISSION HOUSE

Located in San Francisco, the Mission: House is a two-storey mixed use hybridizing residence in San Francisco that explores systems, functions and flexibility and rejects the traditional discussions that surround style and theme. Highlighting the form and practicality of the well articulated spaces, this is a home that emphasizes the importance of how a space is utilized, rather than how it looks.

At street level the comercial unit with its shingled glass facade made entirely from reclaimed insulated glazing operates as a multi-purpose space, transitioning from an informal office or studio to a pop-up retail shop or gallery as required. The main residential zone of the home, including two bedrooms and an open living area, occupies the first floor and supports the change and growth of the owner's family.

Purchased in 2000, the original building was a run down, shabby Edwardian from the 1800s that had suffered a succession of poorly conceived renovations. The ground floor was a commercial space, and the entire house was obfuscated by neon signage and the layers of bad remodels. A ten year experiment by the new owners, themselves designers, has turned the house into a personal trial ground for material experiments, natural lighting, passive energy integration and unorthodox construction techniques.

The house is small, and creative solutions had to be found for storage and flexibility, and to introduce light and air into the home. A large operable skylight above the central bathroom introduces light that floods through the home, providing the interior with fresh air, light, and even rain. The main living area is a highly efficient space that employs generous use of thick "smart walls" and low, generous cabinetry volumes to provide ample storage space for the couple and their two small children. The roof deck completes the picture with a full 4Kwatt P.V. array and an organic vegetable garden.

In the open plan living, dining and kitchen area, enough IKEA cabinetry for six kitchens form an entire wall surface. Painted in green magnetic paint, this serves as a giant gallery for toddler art. Storage 'walls' are the dividers between rooms that are not fixed, but instead mounted on felt gliders, able to be displaced to create a variety of smaller rooms or one large space. The kitchen island volume, clad in Beech, not only provides a generous food preparation space, but also serves as a large, flat space on which the children can paint, draw or model.

Carefully optimized for functionality, the range of flexible living spaces in this unique and unusual San Francisco home were not seeking to emulate any style or achieve a particular aesthetic. However, the result is a handsome, modern interior with a united aesthetic that is inviting and light filled, open enough to change as the family does.



# **BLURRED HOUSE**

Named for its unique approach to the integration of the old and new elements of the integration, the 'Blurred' house is a renovated 1930s Californian Bungalow in Melbourne, Australia. Neither rejecting nor mimicking the existing architectural language of the residence, the renovation instead blurs old and new to produce a hybrid that gradually transitions from existing to contemporary.

The only hint at the renovation when viewing the house from the street is a small clerestory window, but upon arrival at the back of the house the home has evolved into a different building, no longer recognizable as the original home. However, rather than perpetuating the established convention for a jarring juxtaposition that pits the façade against a highly contemporary interior, the transition is nuanced and natural.

Inside, though maintaining the original footprint of the home, the revised plan provides additional bedrooms, varied living spaces, a bathroom with direct access from the pool, lots of light and a strong connection to the landscape. The strong connection between the upper floor and the lower unlocks the design, providing a counterpoint to the prevailing axial configuration of the ground level and introducing a double-height void that opens up the living space to copious natural light.

The house provides a number of living spaces of different size and focus. To the front of the home, the living areas are enclosed, insular and discrete. As the house progresses, these spaces open up into the large interconnected room that seems to flow into and embrace the garden and pool space. This formal transition allows the house to be used differently as the year progresses. In addition, the design will accommodate the children's evolving needs for increased privacy and autonomy as they age.

Many of the original materials were retained in the renovation. The baltic-pine flooring, originally imported to Australia in the 1920s, used throughout the ground level, was restored and re-laid. The walls and ceilings were left white, a neutral backdrop for the family's art collection. The bathrooms are finished with contemporary materials and fittings, but period detail is subtly referenced in the contrasting boarder inlays and the use of hexagonal mosaic tiles.

Bild approaches every design holistically, endeavouring to conceptually embrace the entirety of a building and site. Their designs seek to update and improve upon buildings, responding to the existing character and context of a home without creating a modern imposition or slavishly mimicking historical styles. The 'Blurred' house embodies just such a mediation, distinct from both the area's new housing and the original suburban fabric and finding its own niche somewhere in between.


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















# **SQUARE PEG ROUND HOLE**

This is a home designed to be flexible, accommodating a growing family and allowing for alternate future uses. It celebrates the outdoors with a strong connection to nature, yet is modern, attractive and unique. There is something intimate about the interrelated design of this Torquay home that makes it undeniably inviting.

This project represents a model of increased suburban density - that can accommodate and allow for a growing population while simultaneously enhancing the landscape character of the area The result is a home comprised of two pavilions, with space for a third if required in the future. In effect, these are two self-contained residences, making them ideal for the children's growth or to house more elderly relatives who may need to be close by. The main house consists of three bedrooms, three living spaces, a combined kitchen/meals area, laundry and a study. All this is neatly packed into less than 150 square metres

The smaller pavilion contains two bedrooms, a bathroom, a small study and an open, light-filled dining and kitchen area, with a small, private courtyard located to the north to provide an outlook from the living space.

This range of living spaces, both private and communal, can cater with ease to the changing needs of the young couple, their children and their guests. The main house contains three small living areas that are visually linked, but can accommodate different activities simultaneously, allowing the needs of each occupant to be provided for while retaining a connection with the rest of the household. Small bedrooms encourage children to interact in the open, communal spaces of the home, rather than hide away.

At the centre of the house, a double-brick cylinder serves as the intimate 'round room' - a living room that is private, semi-enclosed and serves as the emotional and physical heart of the home, which also doubles as a study on the upper level.

There is an emphasis placed on active living and natural progressions between the indoor and outdoor spaces, thus taking advantage of the enviable coastal position. Sliding glass panels encourage interaction with the outside, while a large alfresco deck allows for family dining under the stars as often as the weather permits. Rather than guarding against the physical changes that the exterior materials will go through with time, the façade finishes are all hard wearing and designed to age gracefully.



The opportunities provided by this unique deep waterfront property excited the team at Innovative Architects. It was necessary, due to council regulations, for the existing building on site to be retained, but extensive remodeling has provided the clients with an ultra modern family home that retains the warmth of a domestic residence that will grow and change as life does.

Stunning water views are framed and celebrated by the new design, and provide raw, unstructured contrast to the contemporary, sleek lines of the house. Upon arriving at the front gate of the sophisticated residence, you are greeted by a subtle but dynamic façade, a range of calm natural elements highlighted by the drama of unexpected detail. The immediate impact of the home is one that engulfs visitors in the design, in which they become aware of the architectural nature of the home.

Traversing across tranquil Koi ponds to the front entrance, visitors catch a glimpse of one of the forward-facing children's bedrooms, an exquisite hint at the home beyond. A variety of differently sized windows wrap the home, diffusing light into the house that enlivens the space. The kitchen is central to the design. The boy's room is a delightful retreat. Unusual and inspired bed arrangements are functional and fun; storage will keep toys and clothes off the floor and desk space will allow for everything from art projects to science experiments and study.

A quirky boundary fence is an eye-catching and unusual design feature. This is not merely a modern fence, but a barcode that reflects the family name – a testimonial to this client's desire to push the boundary, create an impression and truly claim this stunning home as their own.






















## YUPON HOUSE

The owner-architect of this beautiful home in Texas hoped to build an expansive space to enjoy with his wife and young daughters. The two-storey home is open and connected, and every space is utilized. The home emphasizes closeness and communication between family members, and the interior is clean, warm and friendly, a beautiful, inviting house in which everything has a place and time.

The foyer has two main entrances: one from the street, and an every day entrance from the carport that takes visitors past the expansive kitchen window that rests on one of the concrete counters. The ground floor is an attractive and expansive room, zoned by different spatial volumes and clever textural distinctions. The exposed glue-lam beams that support the second floor are arranged to gently zone the spatial purposes of the large open plan living space beneath them. Galvanized metal screens shade the windows from the sun.

The unity between floors ensures that physical proximity between family members is enhanced by an ability to communicate from upstairs to downstairs. The second floor is arranged around a double loaded corridor with bedrooms on one side and service facilities on the other. The living room volume sits between the master bedroom and the rest of the bedrooms. The second floor windows are protected from the sun by the roof's large overhang.

The study is a hub within the home. Partially separated from the living room, is also acts as a family computer room. The desk runs along the walls, enclosing the study space, and houses four computers, one for each member of the family. As the daughters have grown, the family computer room has not become obsolete: where once this was a quiet play space and an arts and crafts studio for the girls, this is now a study room separate from their bedroom computers.

Contrasting tones that balance inviting warmth and fresh, reflective intensity make the rooms both friendly and light-filled. Carefully separating communal and private spaces has ensured that family connections are maintained without compromising the individual lives of the occupants. The long side of the house faces the park, and the circulation of the first floor responds to a desire to be more engaged with the common recreation area.





### **GROLLO A380 DISPLAY HOME**

Built as a display home to represent Grollo Homes' philosophy of providing clients with individual, customized designs that are of a high quality and strong construction, this home is stylish, large and comfortable, with a suggestion of aeronautical design that provides sleek luxury to the space. However, the spacious home is also flexible and inviting, an ideal design for a family whether small, growing or large.

Dubbed 'the A380', the home reflects qualities associated with the eponymous aircraft and hints at the streamlined curves and smooth finishes of aeronautical design. The façade incorporates large cantilevered eaves that protrude past the body of the building like wings, and the triangular metallic element located to the street subtly represents the nose cone of the plane, redirecting the mass of the design.

The interior is ideally arranged: a rectilinear arrangement of internal rooms is straightforward, allowing occupants and visitors to navigate the home with need and placing focus on the features within the space, rather than the space itself. This emphasis asserts the essence of what Grollo intended to illustrate with the home: it is about what is put in it, rather than what is seen.

Several features of the home are perfect in supporting the lifestyle and habits of a family. There are multiple entertainment spaces that transition easily between formal and informal configurations, and a large theatre room with opening sliders that allow for both open and enclosed living arrangements. These open communal spaces are balanced by private rooms that offer retreats to promote family harmony.

Flexibility is important for a family of any size. The home has four bedrooms, with provision for a guest bedroom within the temporary office space at the front of the dwelling. An existing garage space has the potential to be converted into a sixth bedroom, rumpus room, or home office.

The enclosed alfresco dining space allows for outdoor cooking that can be enjoyed year round, regardless of weather. A scullery provides the option of catering to large groups or large families without creating undue mess in the main kitchen.


Material warmth makes the interior approachable and comfortable. American Oak floorboards lead the occupant from the entry space to the main living area. A fireplace within the family room provides for both convivial gatherings and more intimate moments. Warm and neutral colour tones provide a calming backdrop to the flow of family life.





















### **EDITHVALE BEACH**

To exploit the stunning views over the beach and Port Phillip Bay with an interesting structure that made the most of the flat, congested, absolute beach-front property was the owner's request. But there was more – the home needed to accommodate all the kids as well. So while space was sparse, the demand on that space was high.

This resulted in a sleek and attractive home, with bold geometry in design balanced by a subdued palette and a rich textural range. The roofline is a flat parapet membrane with Colorbond raked, highlighted features, ensuring an angular and contemporary silhouette. Sandstone blocks and render provide a strong material base for the exterior, which is then balanced by aluminium anodised windows, glass balustrades and a feature rock facing.

The wide, inviting entrance to the home leads immediately into the central access point, from which visitors can get their first glimpse of the view. Upstairs, the major living zones are positioned to take full advantage of the stunning and ever-changing panorama, while the elevated position grants visual access to the picturesque, boat shed lined, sand dune beach.

The main section of the upper level is dedicated to communal spaces – the living room and dining room, where one can enjoy the westward views to the water. The dining space flows smoothly onto a shaded deck area - the perfect place to drift out to for a quiet after dinner drink. The daybed and privacy screen ensure that this deck is also available at any time of day.


Found to the eastern end of the upper level, the large kitchen and open scullery are opulently appointed while minimally decorated. This open and relaxed space is perfect for the home cook and comfortable for preparing everything from the simplest snack to the most technical of dishes.

Located to the northern aspect of the upper floor are the master bedroom and en suite, representing the more private and insular spaces of the home. Still capturing some of the view, these are luxurious environments that offer retreat and reprieve from the demands of the more communal spaces.

On the lower level, four generously proportioned bedrooms provide ample space and privacy for the children. In addition, an open living bar and home gym are functional inclusions for a happy, healthy family, with the gym also providing access to the raised pool - an inviting structure that wraps around the north-western front of the home. Located close by to the pool, a specially designed sunken, private and well-protected outdoor living zone is found; an excellent entertaining space that includes a fireplace and barbecue.

A range of different timbers throughout the home add texture and build interior warmth, enhanced by the side gate, floorboards, decking, staircase and some of the furnishings. The home benefits from alternating ceiling heights throughout, which enables it to breathe and allow for the placement of high windows, thus providing more natural light and giving the interior a fresh, open feel.


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












## **HOME IN THE TREES**

This design is based on the premise that homes should not only be beautiful and inspirational, but promote health and well being. Embodying the concept of 'Biophilia', the building has preserved as many of the site's mature trees as possible, and frames stunning views of nature while providing access for natural light.

Every room in the home has a window, providing visual access to the surrounding natural environment and ample natural light. Many of the rooms have windows on at least two sides, helping to eliminate shadow and glare and making these more comfortable places to study, read, or just enjoy conservations in a passive, light-filled environment.

The dining room, kitchen and family rooms are a single, open space where the family can be together doing a variety of things. The playroom is located just off this large room, and can be closed off to reduce noise. Glazed doors ensure that, whether closed or open, children can be adequately monitored. Likewise, the outdoor play area is in view of the kitchen window. The mudroom for corralling coats and dirty shoes is located near the outdoor play equipment and garage.

Wood, porcelain tiles and linoleum form the floors of the house, and were selected for their durability. This house also avoids the use of carpet, which hold dust and allergens and can trigger asthma. The principal interior and exterior material of the home is wood, which was selected both for its timeless beauty and durability. Every outside corner in the home is rounded, making it a safe home to run around, as there's less chance of getting hurt on a sharp corner. The south-facing ample sized patio provides a place in the sun for family use and entertaining.

The children's bedrooms share one bathroom. Secondary spaces in the house, such as the office, have been designed to easily be converted into bedrooms, making a possible six throughout the home, accommodating either a large family or long-staying guests.

On the main floor, the master suite is separate from the kitchen, dining and other principal living spaces but maintains a strong connection. This accommodates the owner's wish to be able to grow old in the home.

The property is located amidst a forest made up of large, mature trees. Having strong views of nature was important, as was integrating the beauty of the trees into the design of the home. The trees become a sculptural element in the garden, and the home is like a wooden boat afloat in this forest glade. The home is both energy efficient and light filled, ideally accommodating a growing family.





## HILLIER-LAWRENCE HOUSE

This spacious, light-filled family home is a glorious space that captures elevated panoramas over the boat-filled waters of Burraneer Bay. Worthy of its exclusive address, this beautiful home will accommodate a family from toddlers to teenagers and beyond.

The building has been nestled into a secluded position on the hillside, angled in such a way that its external appearance conceals the proportions of the spaces within. The contemporary, clean lines fit well in the leafy location and provide a welcome contrast to the brick and tile suburban development of the surrounding waterfront. Detail has been kept to a minimum. Clean lines and white surfaces allow the natural beauty of the location to be captured and drawn inside.

The design provides an exceptionally private home that takes full advantage of the leafy waterfront outlook. The living spaces are generous, and both formal and casual living areas incorporate sliding glass panels that open up to create seamless flow to the outdoors. The multi-purpose playroom adjacent to the main open plan living space and the integrated indoor/outdoor entertainment space with pool and grassed area, offer freedom and flexibility when the children are young and comfortable spaces for entertaining as they grow.

A simple, clean material palette throughout the design lends the space a fresh timelessness. Exterior walls are rendered and painted, providing strength and durability. Interior walls have been plaster-lined for a smoother, softer finish. Floors in the living and circulation areas have been tiled with simple, large white tiles, uniting the spaces. These are easy to clean and provide a sense of flow and space throughout the dwelling. The kitchen is opulent and expansive. Reconstituted stone benchtops and polyurethane cupboards with concealed drawer and door pulls add to the comfortable, subtle nods to functionality that appear throughout the design. The materials used in this space and throughout the home were chosen to be hardwearing and easy to clean – perfect for a glamorous family home.

The home has been designed in such a way that it will not require adaptation to suit the changing needs of the family. The large family home with five separate levels is best suited to parents with children living at home. The two living areas are ideal for the different stages of the family's development and can accommodate a formal dinner party and pool party concurrently. The large level lawn areas are ideal for games or simply enjoying the view. The toddler's playroom can become the teenager's computer or PlayStation room and, eventually, the parent's hobby room. It is also ideally located to serve as a library or TV room.
















## **BLUESTONE STABLES**

Capturing a hint of history within a beautifully articulated contemporary design, this renovated home celebrates the evolution of the building and sits naturally in the existing streetscape. Bluestone and timber provide charm and warmth to the facade, characters that extend into the open and well-connected interior.

Comprising two buildings, the history of this beautiful renovated property has informed the stunning and appropriate renovation. Originally, the home was used as a servant's quarters for a large Reservoir homestead owned by a prominent Victorian family. The adjoining bluestone building served as stables. The lot was subdivided in the early 1920s, and the homestead was demolished to make way for units. However, the bluestone stables and the servant's dwelling were spared and the existing buildings deserved to be updated with respect to the spirit of the original spaces.

The various internal spaces that form the home have been linked, allowing for the easy integration and entertainment of various groups of friends and family, young or old. Open plan living, with zoned areas delineated by subtle design features, provide a sense of separation but maintain the natural flow and progression of rooms throughout the house.

The recycling and reuse of existing materials was a priority during the renovation. The existing floor beams in the stable were removed, and have been utilized within the family room as feature bookshelves, window shelves and an entertainment unit. Much of the pre-existing roofing became natural timber paths that surround the bluestone building, connecting the old structure to the separate external living zones and reaffirming the visual timber notes.

Natural cement render was applied to the existing dwelling to create a smooth transition between the old house and the bluestone stables at the rear. Landscaping was a major design element in itself also, as it highlights and softens the hard stone surfaces and lends approachability to the building. The nearby feature doors, a standout element that defines the yard, were sourced from a wrecking yard.

In addition to the many aesthetic choices within this design, there is a strong focus on sustainability also, with the home's modern-day update transforming it into a highly energy efficient dwelling. Openable double glazed Velux skylights with internal shading devices maximise natural light intake. The electric skylights, complete with block out blinds also allow for an increase in cross-flow ventilation to maximise internal comfort, while also allowing ease of control over light and temperature within the home.

The bold design choices in this renovation were executed to appear seamless and natural. Updating the house to a comfortable, inviting family home without compromising the historical integrity of the design, the renovation is a successful execution of a brief that oozes personality.

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









GROUND FLOOR & SITE PLAN

A hint of Eastern mysticism pervades this stunningly modern dwelling, giving it a unique edge. Multi-generational living is considered in every element of the house, with ease of use at the core. A clean and attractive aesthetic design, in combination with the beautiful vistas available from every room, makes this a truly delightful family home.



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










FIRST FLOOR PLAN

## LOMAS RESIDENCE

This beautiful, fresh design is the result of exploring innumerable options, testing ideas and moving out of a comfort zone. The renovation has created a stunning family home with the quaint impression of a coastal cottage that still offers all the conveniences of modern design.

In renovating this property, the clients sought extra accommodation for family and guests, a stronger connection with the garden, plenty of northern light and a style that would complement the existing cottage separation between the retreat and the rest of the house.

The result is a renovation sympathetic to the style of the old house – it is an update on a traditional beachside cottage, retaining all of the most likeable elements of the design, but providing new connections between spaces and a central articulation that would spiral into private spaces in which to retreat and unwind.

This is a home that can be enjoyed whether congregating for a family dinner, sitting together around the pool or resting in private in one of the more secluded parts of the home. The original front section of the house closes behind full height sliding doors and becomes a retreat. Upstairs, the master bedroom and living space is yet another private area that serves as an oasis for mum and dad.

Access around the house is well considered. Those returning from the surf can easily plunge into the cool water of the pool, and then enjoy a hot outdoor shower. The landscaped outdoor space is as much an element of the design as the interior, with extensive glazing forming a strong connection and the al fresco dining space offering an ideal transitional area.

Inside, polished concrete floors extend into the living space. These are a durable and easy to maintain surface that also make a bold, cool visual statement against which the lighter elements of the design really stand out. Quantum Quartz benchtops in the kitchen and bathrooms are a solid, robust inclusion that are easily maintained. White polyurethane tinted timber floors are durable yet light in colour and feel.

The material and textural palette is remarkably restrained, with mellow whites and calm blues forming a bright, subtle beachy feel against which the family furniture and art create personality.

# **NEW RESIDENCE**

This contemporary design speaks confidently in the vernacular of modern, opulent coastal homes, but draws in an eclectic mix of styles to achieve a unique and custom home for a family. Seeking a beautiful home to accommodate teenage children and a backdrop for an extensive collection of artwork and antique furniture, this is a design as individual as its owners, stunningly suited to the family it houses.

Externally, the house is articulated in timber and pre-finished steel cladding that provides a durable, low maintenance finish that is nonetheless visually striking. The deck incorporates the simple use of stained timber, thus providing a durable finish for outdoor play.

Extensive use of tiles, steel and timber create a robust environment – despite the modern, stylish nature of the design, this is a house that is meant to be 'used' not just admired. Thus, materials were chosen for their durability and inviting nature. Carpet is used in the bedrooms to provide sound attenuation and a different level of comfort and warmth.

The considered placement of bedrooms and living areas makes this home perfectly suited to family life. The master suite sits on the top level of the three-storey structure, with the kids on the lower level and the main living areas acting as a buffer space, providing ideal separation. The children's level also offers direct access to the outside turf areas, its own family room, and access to outdoor decks. The main living area is open plan, with dual sitting areas, dining space, decks and access to the courtyards. The master suite includes a sitting room, a study, direct access to the garage and its own private deck.

Expansive, opulent and beautiful, this is a home that could last a family for generations. Light filled, spacious and extremely well considered, the modern design is simple enough to be considered timeless, and the durable, restrained material palette will last a lifetime. Taking full advantage of beautiful views and a unique site, this is a perfect modern family home in an enviable coastal location.























#### **VASHON ISLAND RESIDENCE**

Located on a small island in Washington State, this sloping, partially wooded five acre rural lot had to accommodate a comfortable home for an active family of four and a separate architecture studio for the owner. The resulting home sits naturally on the site, perfectly oriented to capture views of Mt Rainier and to conform to existing topography.

This picturesque hillside retreat sits at the edge of a meadow against a lush bank of trees and is the epitome of a charming contemporary rural home. The thin roof plane, stretched taut over the exposed structural framework and angular columns, resembles a tent pitched in a forest clearing. Beautiful to look at, it is the considered materiality and careful zoning that ensures this family home is uniquely functional.

The project is sited to take advantage of the view and to fit with the existing topography. The resulting T-shaped design bisects the site into a 'public realm' at the entrance to the house and a 'private realm' on the opposite side that opens up to the meadow and the view.

The house is then divided into two distinct zones, living and working. The living zone, aligned with the topography, contains the bedroom and communal living areas, and has a soft and inviting materiality. Expressed largely in timber, this part of the home features wood flooring, wood-cased window and door openings and is clad in horizontal cedar siding. This is a warm contrast to the sleek, unfussy working zone, which is aligned with a natural ravine. Housing the studio, kitchen, bathrooms, laundry and stairs, the façade of this zone is clad in vertical metal sliding and the interior has concrete floors and minimal wood trim. Practical, modern and functional, these are less personal spaces, with the interior and exterior finishes enhancing the clear thematic distinction between the two zones.

The home was designed with the unfolding lives of the family's two children in mind. The open plan living, dining and kitchen area is a place in which food preparation can be a family affair and entertaining any age group is easily facilitated. A den provides a place in which young children are in earshot but not underfoot, or a private room for big kids to play video games or watch movies.

Upstairs, the children's bedrooms have sleeping lofts, maximizing floor space for play and study. The bedrooms share a common bath, with a sliding door separating the tub and toilet area so that both kids can use the bathroom at the same time. The master bedroom is close enough to this space to allow quick access in an emergency, but distant enough for privacy as the children grow.

Picturesque and pretty amongst lush trees in rural Washington, this family home is cleverly designed to maximize the benefits of a beautiful site. Capturing beautiful views and offering incredible functionality, this is a triumphant design.



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














### KINGSTON HOUSE

This unique and charming home in Tasmania is designed to last; a dwelling for clients who were seeking to lay down their roots, build the perfect house, and never move again. Accessible and inviting, there is something fun, functional and exciting in every corner of this family abode.

Located amongst the lush bushland of Southern Tasmania, the block is comprised of a small paddock surrounded by Gums and Tree Ferns. The house has been situated so as to disturb existing vegetation as little as possible, while making the most of the stunning outlook and capturing views of the bushland.

The exterior is equally respectful and reflective of the bush context. Rendered external walls are fire safe, with appropriate window shutters and rainwater tanks also included. The simple, natural colour scheme sits innately against the woodland backdrop, while the silhouette of the home is simple and distinct without competing with the astounding organic beauty of the land.

Every aspect of the interior has been considered to optimise the family lifestyle, with room to grow and adapt as easily as the children do. Four bedrooms, a study, and two living areas span two levels of the naturally flowing, light filled home. Organic, durable and family friendly materials articulate friendly, functional spaces that can combine or separate easily as life dictates.

The loft forms a secondary living area, functioning as a play space and leading through to children's bedrooms and a climbing wall. Each child's room is individually coloured - a feature that ensures each child has a private space over which they hold ownership. As the children age, these spaces can be repainted and re-imagined as needed.

Ceiling structures support swings and various suspended play equipment, both inside and out. A large, enclosed outdoor play area is visible from the kitchen, dining and loft space.

A very high star rating was achieved through high levels of insulation, thermal mass and passive solar design. The house employs the latest technology in water conservation, solar hot water and photovoltaics. It uses materials with low embodied energy and also incorporates a green roof.

The levity and youth found in these rooms are counter-balanced by the elegance and maturity of the adult spaces. The kitchen, for example, is contemporary and sleek. The timber frame of the home is clearly expressed, forming a border for the open plan layout and thus retaining the inviting warmth of the first floor. In addition, the lounge can be separated acoustically and visually from the other nearby areas, providing a retreat for those quiet times.


















# OMAMA ROAD

Modern, handsome and bold, this contemporary home is both functional and future proof. Balancing practicality, durability, sustainability and lifestyle effortlessly within the architectural design, this is an example of a perfectly timeless family home.

A young family of four requested a design that would reflect the way they live now and in the future. This required careful consideration of the overall design, ensuring the façade wouldn't date. The unflinchingly modern exterior, however, sits in a streetscape dominated by homes designed in the more traditional style of the 1930s and 40s. As a result, the presence of the new residence is sympathetic and contextual to the neighbourhood. It sits upon an established, landscaped block that gently flows from public to private and doesn't dominate the street.

The fence serves dual purpose. Its scale provides a sense of security and privacy to the front garden and the house, but to passers by it is low profile and transparent. Emphasis has been placed on form to ensure it is a subtle addition, not dominating the site's frontage. A range of textures, tones and materials accentuates the modular masses and articulation of the building, uniting to communicate the overall form. The entrance is framed by a vertical glazed void, an ephemeral contrast to the solid clad walls of the habitable rooms either side.

Internally, the house communicates a philosophy of spatial experience. There is a journey through the residence, a series of logically flowing spaces. A range of spatial volumes, heights and widths provide differing senses of enclosure, differentiating between public and private spaces. A variety of solid and open glazed doors provide flexibility to the design, perfect for a growing family and suitable to Melbourne's changeable weather. The home is naturally well lit and ventilated.

Practical usage informs every space. The gorgeous kitchen is the height of functionality, featuring a butler's pantry and a menu planning area. Outdoors, a pool and an outdoor entertaining space also allows room for fitness activities. The master bedroom features a walk in robe and en suite, as well as four bedrooms upstairs that cater to a growing family.

This is a beautiful home that is low maintenance, clean and delightfully planned. It's view to the future is tempered by a sense of fun, something that is integral to family life, while the timelessness of the design ensures it will be a comfortable home for years to come.




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









FIRST floor plan

## **EASTLYNNE HOUSE**

Designed as a natural progression of the historical styles it embodies, there is an irrefutably classic charm about this home. Taking cues from the American Colonial Revival, which in turn is a nod to Georgian architecture, the home neither seeks to slavishly recreate nor garishly modernise the classic architecture style. Instead, the home seeks to honour this theme in spirit, but execute it with contemporary construction techniques and present-day conveniences.

Approaching the house, one could be forgiven for thinking they'd been transported to the American Midwest, such is the immediate impact of the subtly expressed but clearly defined Neo-Colonial style. Entrance to the house is granted through a bright red door - a warm and friendly addition to the house that stands out boldly against the muted white and grey palette of the rest of the façade.

Inside, a mixture of formal and informal spaces are designed in a relaxed blend of pastoral English and American family styles, ensuring there is ample space for everyone. The home is designed for the temporary, but frequent visits of adult children and visiting nieces and nephews. Three guest bedrooms are placed upstairs and can be locked off when not in use, while the master bedroom is located on the ground floor along with the kitchen and informal living space. Adjacent to the garage, a den provides a place in which visiting children can watch movies late into the night without disturbing the adults. The formal sitting room blends perfectly with the overall theme of the house and is a tranquil, elegant room in which to escape the commotion. Meanwhile the large living room, with views to Mount Macedon and Hanging Rock, forms a lively hub for family life.

Adding a real 'tailored' quality to the design, the home is full of personal touches that are unique to the needs of the owners and their family. The dining room, which is painted 'ox-blood red' (a classic Georgian colour), is a formal dining space for family occasions, while informal meals and barbecues are catered for on the large elevated deck. A 'drinks cupboard' near the kitchen allows access to the kettle and herbal tea collection without intruding upon the kitchen proper.

Despite it's classical appearance, this is a modern home through and through, designed with contemporary conveniences in mind and constructed with cutting-edge sustainable and durable techniques. The style takes note of historical fixtures, displaying the suitability of the American Colonial Revival architecture to the Australian way of life as well as the landscape of the Macedon Ranges.



Together, the Greentree family have formed Greentree Australis.



### PRIVATE CITY BEACH RESIDENCE

Imposing and modern, the bold angles and textural blocking of this design are balanced by the inclusion of gentle curves, making the home both visually exciting and approachable. A balanced material palette with warm and fresh colours complete the look.

A strong emphasis has been placed on entertaining, while the home exudes a feeling of casual opulence. For example, the kitchen is large and practical, elegantly incorporating modern, top of the range appliances, and holds a strong connection to the outdoor entertaining area and pool. This interrelationship provides a perfect flow-on space for casual barbecues and more formal dinner parties.


The site's proximity to the beach meant that careful consideration of strong sea breezes was important. To accommodate this, the home itself wraps around the pool area, giving it protection from the prevailing winds. Meanwhile, the extended courtyard arrangement allows the rear part of the home to share in the available northern light. The communal living areas are all located on the ground floor, with the home's resort theme dictating a strong emphasis on the interaction of these spaces with each other and the courtyard space. The living rooms are zoned such that they can either be used in conjunction with one another or zoned off via double doors.

The upper floor of the home is entirely private, with the master suite buried within this enclave space and separated from the children's wing by a bridge over the large foyer void. Located on the ground floor is a guest suite which could easily be the master suite if the owners ever decide to live solely on the one level.

The home is designed to accommodate children from young teenagers through to early adulthood. As such, it offers comfortable, private spaces for each of the children. The separate wing for the children allows them to pursue their own interests away from their parents. The inclusion of private en suites and walk in robes to the minor bedrooms means the children will be unlikely to outgrow the design, even in adulthood.

The interior form offers sufficient privacy and space to be both comfortable and practical.







### WATERGUM AVENUE

The striking modular façade of this suburban home in Melbourne gives way to an open contemporary design in which the competing and evolving requirements of a family comfortably find space.

This isn't your typical pitched-roof suburban family home. A variety of textural elements combine in a visually diverse exterior. Brick on the lower level serves to ground the design, and ties it with the streetscape. Timber cladding is a warm contrast, suggesting a connection with the natural environment. Extensive glazing lightens the design and captures distinct city views, particularly from the upper floor.

Inside, spaces were implemented to best suit the family's day to day living. The owners wanted children's spaces upstairs, including bedrooms and a living area. The shared entertainment space and the master bedroom were to be downstairs. A lap pool was included in the brief, to suit the small block.

Several considerate design notes ensure comfort as the family grows. A concession to safety is made in the garden: the pool is fenced off and separate, enabling children to play in the space with less supervision. As needs change, the two distinct living spaces ensure privacy for the family, allowing teenage family members to entertain friends without bothering parents or siblings.

The open plan kitchen and family area is expansive and comfortable. This is an ideal place for quiet family meals or entertaining larger groups. Timber floors make this a cosy, inviting space. The timber floors extend to the alfresco area, linking these two spaces. The outdoor entertaining room is all-weather and fully appointed, adding a little luxury to the design.

Large windows enforce the modern day family open-living concept. This also allows unobstructed views of the backyard, allowing for mum or dad to keep an eye on children from the kitchen and living area.

A multitude of storage spaces and walk in robes are incorporated into the layout. This is perfect for a large family, helping them to organize and store a variety of items. This home is easily adjustable for the growing family, accommodating four bedrooms, a study and home office, which can easily be transformed into another bedroom.







# **DOLAN RESIDENCE**

Located in Currumbin Valley's world-recognised Ecovillage in Queensland, Australia, the 'Dolan Residence' is a sustainably designed home that, from initiation of design and for the life of the building, limits environmental impact. Practical, efficient and modern, the simple but effective design ideally fits the client's brief and provides the owners with a beautiful sustainable design.

Simple lines and modern materials give the house an attractive contemporary aesthetic. The house's rotation and curve was based on a point at the top of the site, facing north, then curving to the aspect of the house to maximize the views and privacy of the billabong to the north. The home also represents best practice in sustainable design and construction, an important consideration for the clients.

The design balances bold geometric shapes with simple, clean lines. Australian sourced products were used exclusively, and recycled and remilled timber was used where available. A strong connection between indoor and outdoor entertaining spaces makes transitioning between these living zones feel natural and comfortable, and there is a flow and connection throughout the home that is integral to the design.

Ventilation was central to maintaining the free flow of the home design. Louvred windows to each habitable room help in cross-ventilating the space, and ceiling fans aid in circulating the air on still nights. Passive solar design is particularly focused on cooling in summer, important in the Queensland climate.

Well suited to family living, even as the unit grows, the separate guest wing has much to recommend it. Fantastic, unique, isolated views of the billabong ensure that this is a wonderful tranquil retreat, either for parents, or for teenagers in the future. It's also a great place for visiting friends and family, separate from the main house but still linked.

This simple and unselfconscious design is sustainable, practical and attractive. The design takes the principles of sustainable living and executes them with individual flair, and the resulting home has a unique personality, ideally suited to the lives of the clients. This beautiful home offers the best in sustainable, environmentally conscious design, a strong connection to the community and a pleasant backdrop to family life.






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
















#### PADDINGTON HOUSE

Located in a dense suburban area near Sydney, Australia, this cutting-edge home reinterprets an historical cottage, simultaneously refining and simplifying the design.

Renovated for a couple with a young family, Nobbs Radford Architects sought to create deceptively minimal spaces that would embody abiding tranquility. The result is a subtle, modern house that is dynamic and comfortably suited to family life. The unfussy, open rooms create a sense of private, calm flow and connection - an important feature given the unavoidable noise of a high density inner-city suburb.

Aesthetically, the home is articulated as a contextual response to the urban landscape. An external palette of rustic face brick and form-lined concrete responds to the solidity and massing of the surrounding terrace housing. The deep columns to the rear create framed thresholds for large pivot doors, which retreat under the concrete planter awning to provide a strong two-way connection between the outdoors and the home.

Despite the more contemporary context found within the house, the original cottage still forms the point of entry. The hallway is maintained to the depth of the front room, where the order of the new house becomes apparent. A central unfolding timber box mediates the original space and new addition, while also comprising a storage space for concealed audio and visual equipment, the laundry and the main stair. Internally, the palette shifts to timber and white planes punctuated with darker charcoal.

The progression of refined spaces in this well articulated family home are a functional response to the specifics of the family's patterns of living, and encourages a relaxed home life.














SECOND LEVEL PLAN

# **OXLEY HOUSE**

This inner-city family home is an energy efficient, cost-effective house for a small family on a small block. Visually, the house has a very modern and unique impact upon viewing the north facing 'L' shaped house from the street. The specific shape of the home capitalises on an enviable aspect, taking advantage of the orientation, prevailing breezes, solar access and the surrounding context of the 405 square metre block to ensure energy efficiency. Low maintenance, sustainable materials have been utilised throughout the design in a modern and aesthetically striking way.

The open plan kitchen, living and dining space is central to the design. Two large stacking doors extend the living area directly onto a large terrace and beautifully landscaped backyard. Towards the front, the living area is extended onto the double height entry terrace, ultimately creating a strong connection between the interior and exterior spaces.

The home is perfect for a small family on a tight budget to which it caters, particularly on the ground floor. The open plan kitchen, dining and living space is a hub around which family life centers, allowing integration, visibility and easy access between spaces from all internal areas. Upstairs, all bedrooms within the home are oversized, allowing for multiple uses and conversion to more mature spaces as the children grow older.

An impressive amount of inconspicuous storage makes every room feel uncluttered. On the ground floor, the 'L' shaped cabinetry runs along two sides of the house, and in total over 32 square metres of storage is provided throughout the house. This is an ideal inclusion for a busy and growing family, ensuring every hobby, item of clothing and appliance has a place. The cabinetry also reduces the solar heat gain from the summer afternoon sun, with most storage located along the western wall of the house.

Maintaining privacy from the neighbours, the home still boasts unequalled ventilation, views and a strong solar aspect that allows the family to be cooler in summer and warmer in winter. Eye catching and beach-themed, the relaxed and considered design implements a range of environmental planning strategies and various environmental initiatives that allows it to achieve an 8 star energy efficiency rating. This is an affordable home built for under \$300,000 that proves sustainability does not always have to sacrifice aesthetic quality or functionality in a family friendly design.



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










## PYMBLE COURTYARD HOUSE

Enriching the existing elements of the home and reinterpreting tired spaces while adding life with a new layout, energy and functionality have been brought to this property. Providing three bedrooms, two living spaces and a range of amenity spaces in a post-war cottage, the new space is bright, inviting and practical.

The site presented an immediate challenge – small, long and narrow, it was integral to retain existing courtyards and a northerly aspect. A number of setbacks regarding the building envelope where posed by the council, but were met and dealt with. The conviction behind the design and the willingness to adapt without compromising the integrity of the home ensured success.

The entrance to the house is clearly defined by an avenue of trees, which walls in the garden courtyard. As the plants grow, this area will become more private, but will never entirely close off the street, maintaining an important connection to the community.

The north facing living space opens onto a courtyard, and the existing studio outbuilding was retained. This inspired the implementation of compound buildings, visually connected spaces physically separated by courtyards. All living spaces and bedrooms have carefully placed openings which face or overlook the courtyards, framing intimate garden views. First floor rooms look out to the tree canopies of nearby ovals, and no window overlooks the neighbour's private spaces.

The rumpus room in the studio building provides a discrete living space for teenagers, a safe zone that nonetheless allows autonomy, with free access for friends to come and go through the courtyard gate. As the children grow, this space can become a home office or a guest house, and will easily adapt to changing patterns of family life. When the clients so choose, the house is alive to the street, and can open right through the family room into the front garden courtyard. The home has become a favourite in the neighbourhood as it is so friendly and invitingly open to the street.

There is something classic, inviting and cosy about the home. Rather than forcing a contemporary interior into a heritage envelope, the spaces are unfussy and classically designed. Open and filled with natural light by virtue of clever planning, the living spaces are beautifully designed and comfortably decorated, unselfconsciously adopting individual style that is understated without the sterility of many modern homes.


















## **RIVER HOUSE**

A strong connection to the river provides a theme for this beautiful family home that weaves through the flowing collection of informal family spaces. Conceptually, the home separates into two zones: a space for parents, and a space for children. In practice, the home is well connected and progresses seamlessly to the stunning river views.

Seeking a new home for a family of four, the clients wanted four bedrooms, two studies, separate living areas, amenity spaces, garage space for two cars and as much outdoor area as the small piece of land would allow. Modern and unrestrained, the resulting home is a magnificent family space based around interaction with the river. The strong link ensures a picturesque place to entertain, but also provides a playground upon which the children can grow up, playing in boats, fishing and swimming. The strong grey façade, broken up by timber highlights and clever annexed massing, creates a strong yet timeless statement that fits naturally on the riverfront block.


Upon entering the home, the house slowly unfolds, culminating in the living room which provides the most spectacular and complete view across the river. The kitchen is the heart of the space, opening to the courtyard and the al fresco dining space, and connecting to both the children's portion of the home and the adults. Clean, fresh and open, white marble benchtops provide a durable and hardwearing surface with just a subtle hint of decadence.

On the first floor level, a bridge provides the only connection between the children's rooms and the master suite. This element of the design breaks up the bulk of the home, a concession to the neighbouring homes to the south that allows sun to reach the buildings. Roof pitches are low, another concession to the solar access of the neighbours.

A lot of thought has been put into the zoned spaces, allowing the family to grow, and ensuring that the home will be able to adapt when the children grow and begin leaving home. Outside, stepped, level garden terraces down to the river are a safe play space that can be observed from the kitchen. Inside, the children's rooms are large, offering space for sleepover guests and ideal for when the children enter their teenage years. A spare bedroom allows the option for more children. The adult spaces are private, allowing for retreat from the rest of the house, an enjoyable space that is relaxing, intimate and insular.



The contemporary design and well zoned living spaces of this split level double storey home allow for easy living through all the stages of raising a family to down sizing. Rooms have been designed to provide a series of comfortable private and shared spaces that will transition easily as children age and eventually move out of the home.

The cleverly built integrated indoor/ outdoor living themed open plan family/meals kitchen and alfresco area, make entertaining inviting all year round and is one of the key standout features of the home.

Upstairs, daily living areas are carefully divided. A rumpus area provides a perfect retreat for children and teenagers to relax alone or with friends. A distinct formal living and TV room allows a private retreat for adults or an intimate space for family time. The allotment has been maximized by shaping the design to the slope of the block, with a split-level to the rear optimizing the size of living areas, creating privacy and taking advantage of northern solar orientation.

This home is a functional space suited to a growing family and packed with impressive features that are not only practical but look great. The high gloss polished Spotted Gum floor covering is a hardy material that is easy to clean. The aluminium bi-fold doors that integrate the living and al fresco indoor/outdoor spaces are ideal for entertaining, connecting the two spaces for year-round outdoor entertaining.

Grand and impressive from the street and sitting comfortably on a sloping block, this home is ideal. The carefully considered internal spaces are ideally suited to the transitional life stages of a growing family, and the timeless materials and beautiful design is the perfect backdrop for family life.

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















# **DUNE ROAD RESIDENCE**

Located on a classic oceanfront site, this low-key two-storey home offers an idyllic beachside existence for a family. Replacing an existing property, the home now offers three levels: one for the family, another for guests and a final level for living and dining.

The original property located on site, slated for demolition, was built into the dune before the current coastal construction standards required a much higher elevation. The goal in replacing the property was to maintain the existing scale and dynamic of the site and design a home that would reflect the footprint and spirit of the original home.

The resulting home is beautiful and functional. Clad on the outside in Alaskan cedar shingle panels interspersed with glazing, the home makes a bold impression that is subdued enough to sit comfortably in its stunning oceanside location.

Solar control is achieved through the use of overhangs to the southern exposures. Extra thick walls allow for superior insulation and a geothermal system is employed for cooling.

A simple glass and shingle pavilion overlooks a negative edge pool, providing an ideal space for the family to congregate and play. A path from the garage leads through a natural seaside landscape along the pool and up to the house, offering a strong connection to the beautiful natural environment.



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


















#### **ELWOOD RESIDENCE**

This sustainable family home demonstrates that an eco-friendly property has to sacrifice neither aesthetics nor character in achieving a favorable star rating. Pairing striking aesthetic decisions with state of the art energy efficient innovations, this avant garde home is eye catching and environmentally sensitive, refusing to compromise one for the other.

The two-storey home balances a lot of competing requirement, but it does so with effortless flair. Providing a functional, beautiful and slightly eccentric interior space for a family, there is ample room and dedicated space to cater to every interest and need of the occupants of the space.

Central to the design is attention to environmental sensitivity, but at no point does this overwhelm the spatial and aesthetic quality of the space. The exterior is modern and bold. Cyprus Macrocarpa timber cladding highlights the strong curve to the front façade and garage, balanced by the dark grey render at the entrance to the space, a subtle lowlight that grounds the design. Copper cladding to the second level provides a rich red hue that warms the home, lending it an inviting approachability well suited to a family friendly design.

The kitchen, living and dining space occupy a shared area and are connected but discrete, allowing the family to connect or disperse as they desire. This is a lighthearted space that combines traditional contemporary elements like rich timber floors, stone benchtops and a marble splashback with bright feature items like the bright furniture, unusual sculptural lamps and brightly coloured feature walls.

A strong connection to the beautifully landscaped garden is maintained through large double glazed cedar sliding doors that open the living area visually and physically to the space. Located in a high-density area, cleverly placed opaque glazing provides privacy from neighbouring flats.

Upstairs, three bedrooms and two bathrooms are restrained. These are private spaces that offer a calm retreat for individual family members, but splashes of bright colour unite them within the design and are a reminder of the strong aesthetic choices throughout the home.

Open, spacious and colourful, this is a home that engenders happiness, an ideal accompaniment to family life. Boasting a 7 star energy efficiency rating, this is a gorgeous home that represents best practice for domestic housing in a sustainable future.





The owners of this Victorian terrace in Paddington were seeking an architectural update, one that would convert the aging, damp and poorly lit building into an open, light-filled and inviting family home. The newly renovated house is an innovative archetype for family living that evolves naturally from a central, integrated living space, balancing private and public spaces in a subtle and attractive modern design.


The existing home, though somewhat the worse for wear, had the benefit of a fantastic, larger than average site. Unfortunately, a poorly conceived addition built in the 1980s had intruded upon most of the outdoor space, rendering the backyard pokey and unusable. Given the requirement of a home suitable for a growing family, and the hope of introducing some light and air into the house from a usable outdoor space, the owners contracted PWA.

The new range of areas extend from a communal core. This central space is a room in which everyone can gather, the most public in the house, and where a series of progressively more private zones branch off from. This arrangement both suits the individual family members and provides accommodation for any visiting extended family and a live-in nanny.

The heart of the home is found in the generously proportioned kitchen and family room. A casual environment that is more like a local café than a formal dining room, this large and relaxed space flows naturally onto the new outdoor deck, which is ideally suited for enjoying a barbecue in the summer months as the children play on the terraced area or grass.

This wonderful interaction between public and private places, as well as indoors and outdoors, has refreshed the tired terrace home. Simple contemporary design and balanced, flowing interiors flood the home with light, while well-considered and flexible rooms ensure it is an ideal envelope in which the family can grow and change, updating and re-imagining spaces at their whim.





The grand foyer of this regal home is the first hint of the casual luxury that pervades the house. Blending traditional European architecture with a hint of the colonial Australian aesthetic expressed in natural materials, the home sits comfortably amongst the trees in this lush valley.

Inside, the house is opulently proportioned. High ceilings and large, impressive windows in warm timber frames provide light and enhance the sense of magnificence gently insinuated throughout the space. Split across two storeys, the house offers four generous bedrooms, amenity spaces, and both casual and formal communal spaces.

On the ground floor, the open plan kitchen, meals and family area overlooks the pool, reflecting glittering light into the house and creating a strong link to the exterior. Transitioning between the pool area and the house feels natural, and from there, another strong link is created to the entertainment area.

Separate from the main house, but connected through the outdoor entertaining area, this open, light filled room sits behind the three car garage and is concealed from the approach by a consistent roofline. Large bi-fold doors open up to the outdoor space, creating a large outdoor room that offers ample cover from the hot afternoon sun and a place to sit and contemplate the gorgeous pool.

Due consideration was given to the balance of life at home and competing commitments. The home office has a separate entry to the rest of the house, ensuring an isolated room in which to study or work, distinguishing these pursuits from the more relaxed aspects of family life.

A balanced array of formal and informal living areas and private and communal spaces ensure that whether the family is hoping for a quiet night in or to host a large party, there's a dedicated or appropriate space. Naturally benefitting from the beauty of the Australian bushland that surrounds the house, this valley mansion is excitingly decadent.

## C-HOUSE

This beautiful modern construction, the C-House, is one of three urban villas that make up King's Hill, a unique residential development located in Cleveland, Ohio. Despite the urban location, the site is an idyllic, park-like setting, with the house responding to both contexts, resulting in a beautifully articulated family home perfectly suited to the site.

The site's proximity to a busy vehicular thoroughfare and its views of downtown Cleveland connect the house strongly to both the urban and the industrial. This link is reflected in the bold lines and crisp colour palette of both the exterior and interior of the home. Subdued greys and whites sit naturally against the distant city skyline and contrast with the natural landscape.

Extensive glazing and a unique, 'stacked' program provide access to the dramatic landscape and skyline from every space, framing uninterrupted views of Lake Erie. This sectional strategy produces a cantilever that creates formal intrigue and provides shelter for the outdoor space below. Full height glass walls are arranged opportunistically, framing the outdoors and bridging the connection between inside and outside. This composition has a tremendous impact on the perception of the whole and suggests a varied outward disposition to its surroundings.

The interior space is light filled and inviting, with an open interconnectedness that flows between spaces. The kitchen serves as a functional and aesthetic centre to the design, offering both casual and formal dining spaces, a practical food preparation area and a comfortable environment in which the family can gather.

The monolithic form and white materiality imbue the architecture with a sense of 'otherworldliness', distinguishing it from the landscaped environment. The shape appears to emerge as if carved from the cube of the home. The mass and structure of the house is substantial, and sits as an unexpected and iconic presence for commuters between downtown Cleveland and the Western Suburbs.



















### MINTZ RESIDENCE

As part of a series of urban villas comprising the unique residential development on King's Hill in Cleveland, Ohio, the Mintz Residence has been designed to accommodate a couple, with ample space in which to grow as their family does.

Despite being situated within the urban context of the Detroit Shoreway neighbourhood, this 'virgin' site is an idyllic enclave within a park-like setting. With uninterrupted views of Lake Erie and downtown, in addition to the home's proximity to a main road, the site is clearly linked to its urban context.

Designed for a couple, the building program called for spaces to work within (such as a studio space for the photographer in the pair), living areas and more relaxed zones in which to 'play'. The floor plan distributes these environments over four levels due to the limited site area, as well as a desire to fully capture the unique and stunning views offered by the site. The vertical arrangement gives the architecture a sense of the urban aesthetic, in contrast to the residential scale.

A series of minimal and discrete volumes that stack and shift in plan and section articulate the home, generating the unusual and attractive exterior. More than simply a compositional device, these formal manipulations take advantage of the unique characteristics and constraints of the site, with the multiple shapes suggesting a subtle integration into the dramatically sloping hillside. As the volumes stack and overlap, the resulting spaces form a series of terraces and cantilevers that shelter the exterior area.

The intersections between interior volumes create dramatic, double-height and mezzanine spaces, blurring the boundaries between communal and private domestic zones. The exterior envelope fenestration makes its presence known inside, creating a distinctive series of views, panoramas and vistas that frame the exterior as a dynamic element of the interior space.






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## BILGOLA-2

Alterations and additions to this house have created a range of separate, yet connected living spaces that accommodate every occupant of the home. A strong link between outdoor and indoor spaces, in addition to an eclectic, diverse aesthetic, has resulted in a unique and comfortable family space.

The building was originally a four bedroom split-level Habitat project built in the 1970s; an architecturally designed residence, with good consideration to light, contemporary design practices and good planning. The clients were keen to maintain the 70s design features and to incorporate the style into the renovated space, resulting in a new aesthetic that is funky, charming and individual.

Materials throughout the home were chosen to match the existing space, such as the clinker brick to the exterior walls and vertically expressed, horizontal weatherboards around the windows. Timber framed doors and windows have an elegance to them, while glass louvered windows were used to create new openings and optimise air flow through the home.

Interconnected living spaces have created a continuity within the house that extends from the kitchen courtyard all the way through to the split-level spaces, the living room and the terrace opening. The distinct rooms within this area are visually connected to each other and the outdoors, providing a pleasant and relaxed living environment.

Privacy and separation are facilitated by well-spaced bedrooms and a series of private retreats. The five bedrooms, each individually decorated and featuring a unique aspect, are split between three levels. The parents' retreat and private roof terrace offer environments to escape from the pressures of life.

Having reconsidered the internal spaces to create a strong connection with the beautiful views and take advantage of the outdoor spaces, this renovation is truly wonderful, providing a comfortable home for a close-knit family that will adapt to the changing and competing demands of their lifestyle.

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









FIRST FLOOR PLAN











## MOSMAN

The update to this federation-era cottage in Sydney, Australia had to balance the practical addition of new family spaces with the various requirements of the local government conservation area in which it resides. Maintaining the existing roofline and matching the style of the surrounding homes, the renovated design has a classical appearance that recognises and respects the proportions of the original house, while offering new, comfortable and functional spaces for a larger family.

While the exterior of the renovated cottage acknowledges the heritage of the area, the interior is much more contemporary, featuring a neutral colour palette and subtle, elegant decoration that spans the neatly articulated and zoned home, thus allowing modern functionality while maintaining the dignity of the original style.

The newly defined interior space offers separate zones for the children and parents, an important consideration in a family with three young boys. A new staircase to the upper floor provides access to what was once an expansive, but under utilised general living area. Two new bedrooms, a bathroom and a rumpus room now occupy the space, providing a comfortable zone for the kids.

The rumpus room on the first floor forms a shared space between the two upstairs bedrooms. Relaxed and informal, it allows the kids to make a mess, make noise and play without intruding on the parents' space. Conversely, a sitting room with a gas fireplace is found downstairs - a child-free zone, thus offering both parties a retreat to escape to.

The existing bedrooms, bathrooms and utility areas on the ground floor have been updated to create more comfortable and liveable spaces. The master suite, in particular, has been extended to include a new dressing room and an updated en suite; little luxuries that increase the cosiness of the home.

The updated kitchen is beautiful to behold. Stone, timber and white cabinetry against light olive walls are classic and soothing. Modern, top-of-the-line appliances increase the functionality of the space, while traditional handles, fittings and fixtures give it a more conventional aspect. An enlarged island bench enables the family of five to sit together in the kitchen for casual meals, making it the symbolic heart of the home.



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

An abundance of natural light floods the home. Solar orientation accommodates natural breezes and reduces glare, while extensive glazing provides a minimal barrier between indoor and outdoor spaces and allows a natural transition between the two.

The impressive street presence of this three-storey home ensures that it stands out from the crowd. The unmatched attention to detail and the unique use of materials give it a contemporary, yet timeless appearance. Profile metal roofing with custom gutters are a sleek, elegant finish to the handsome exterior silhouette.

Extensive glazing highlights and emblazons the predominately white walls. The two-storey wall of glass found at the centre of the home is all at once attractive, modern and artistic, complementing the unique cubic design of the home. The visual access to the pool that this glazing provides from the main entertaining spaces is an alluring feature, with the tones of the interior and pool contrasting with the handsome Melbourne bluestone outside.

Given the need to accommodate three young boys, creating a separate space for each child was important. As such, the boys' bedrooms are spacious and practical, ideal areas for them to grow in and well-catered to their changing needs. A separate activity room located nearby also allows for the boys to entertain their friends independently of their parents. In addition, a large lawn area, found to the rear of the home and separated from the pool and al fresco dining area, provides ample space for the boys to kick a football around.

Providing basement level parking for up to six cars, a wine cellar, expansive bedrooms and bespoke spaces for every conceivable family activity, this is an enviable home. Stark and modern, the home captures an abundance of natural light and is magnificently crafted with a lavish palette of natural materials.





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














### PERMANENT HOLIDAY HOME

This is a home that always feels like a desirable vacation destination, embracing the luxury and solitude of a holiday house alongside the comforts of a permanent residence. Blending a Colonial Farmhouse with a New England Shingle aesthetic, the elegance and tradition of the execution is incomparable.

Originally built in the 1940s as a small colonial farmhouse on a corner block, the location allowed for an expansion of the residence that wouldn't disrupt the scale of the homes along the main street. The new development takes advantage of the southern exposure and the long, narrow site. As a result, every arrival point of this gorgeous property feels like a luxurious rural retreat.

The home is designed for an international businessman and his family, with the design arising from the acknowledgement that while many homeowners may have a primary residence and a vacation home, this would not be ideal for his family, who travel often. After several typical business trips, spending a weekend away from home seemed less than desirable. Thus, creating a home in the style of a hotel or holiday property seemed like an ideal solution.

The resulting façade is simple, sophisticated and charming, evoking a large but nonetheless cozy 'Bed and Breakfast' aesthetic amongst a lush, elegantly landscaped garden. The interior is no less stylish, with a range of luxurious finishes in large, open rooms setting the tone of the house. Durable and easily maintained materials, including Maple hardwood floors and stone tiles, are framed by quietly painted walls and trim. This ensures the spaces are not too precious, but rather are relaxed and comfortable.

The bedrooms are not overly large, since the majority of the home is dedicated to entertaining and separate social and study venues. On any given weekend, the family may play host to as many as 24 guests, so ample space was needed. As such, a clever allocation of space was used to ensure the house never feels too 'big'.

The 'permanent vacation home' design approach also resulted in a number of special features. The Parking Pavilion is designed as a multi-use space; during the summer months cars can be parked elsewhere so as to close the pavilion off and create an outdoor dining room for large parties. The cupola acts as the chandelier, while the up-lights of the pavilion illuminate the exposed structure above.

This delightful design manages to pair the open, inviting and undemanding elegance of a luxury hotel with all the comfort and familiarity of a family home. Undeniable charm and the suggestion of togetherness that pervades every function within is the true success of this unique home design.



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





























# **ELWOOD HOUSE**

Designed by Jost Architects and built by the owner of the home, this beautifully articulated, contemporary envelope unfolds into a functional and handsome family space. Employing simple construction techniques and bold but inviting modern design, the house is distinctive and exciting without compromising the comfort of the occupants.

Externally, the house is clearly separated into two upper and lower elements. The base is a solid masonry form that grounds the design, giving the impression that it is carved from a solid block and hollowed out. Areas of the interior are revealed from different external angles, which in turn generate differing vistas of the surrounding area on the inside. The timber clad upper level sits over top as a lighter visual element, but also conceals the more private spaces of the home.

This timber clad upper level is crafted to interact with the ground floor, cantilevering over some areas to form sheltered outdoor spaces and pulling back in other areas to open the interior up to natural light. The use of a flat roof reduces the height and bulk of the structure, giving it a restrained street presence, while the arrangement of cladding, angled junctions and glazing emphasises flow and form, in opposition to the often 'boxy' arrangement of other contemporary home designs.

The success of the internal layout, on the other hand, extends from the distinct but physically proximal communal living spaces, private rooms and utility spaces. All living spaces, including an internal courtyard on the ground level, are separated and discrete, with large, double-glazed sliding doors added to allow the owners to visually and physically combine the spaces together from the front to the rear of the home. This design allows the parents to keep an eye on the kids anywhere in the house, but also lends itself to more intimate, private spaces when the doors are closed.

As the children grow, the well distributed main bedrooms and separate living spaces will allow privacy and comfort for all the family members. Thanks to the cleverly crafted design, there is plenty of scope for the family to grow within the house and employ the key spaces for different purpose as their needs evolve.

A combination of simple, natural and low maintenance finishes creates an inviting and neatly defined interior, one that is durable, attractive, and easy to clean. The exposed aggregate concrete and timber engineered floorboards are laid alongside dark natural stone tiling to balance cool and warm tones, with the variety of textures adding a second layer of visual interest and serving to bring cosiness and life to the home.


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

## TENNYSON POINT

Maintaining the frame of a solid, well-constructed 1960s waterfront home, this dramatic residence offers views to Sydney's Parramatta River and beyond, elegantly framing the water in warm timber and setting the tone of this family retreat.

The four level home is arranged over cascading tiers, which lead from the street front to the water's edge through a series of well connected indoor and outdoor spaces. These spaces are, in turn, zoned into four distinct areas that distinguish between private and social living.

The internal plan is divided into intimate bedroom areas, which afford privacy from the street, and open, sun lit recreation spaces that provide a physical and visual link to the landscaped waterfront outside. As such, this versatile, luxurious home embraces the challenges of the site and demonstrates an unyielding attention to detail.

The success of the home lies in its encouragement of family togetherness, with the integrated spaces offering environments for everyone to live and play. Equally important, however, are the private rooms, with each offering respite and space when desired. Sleeping and study spaces are located at the top tier of the home, with both the parent's and the children's rooms featuring outlooks towards the water from their respective study areas.

The open plan of the primary living and dining spaces offers an ideal location for the family to congregate. The exterior recreation environments, including the pool, deck and yard, are visually linked to both the formal living spaces and the lower rumpus room. This is important, as it allows active supervision for younger children and casual interactions between the family both outside and inside.

Materials expressed throughout the home are lively and natural, providing a healthy environment free from artificial and chemical finishes. Extensive application of hardwood timber was utilised in the new works, while externally, stone salvaged from the demolition acts to ground the building. This inviting, solid and basic aesthetic suggests the strength and warmth that should exist within a family.



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














### FAMILIAR HOUSE IN MARBELLA

Located on the outskirts of Puerto Banús in one of the most exclusive developments on the Sun Coast in Marbella, this stunning modern structure is a decadent, spacious family home built on a steep slope. Nestled against the side of a mountain, the building captures stunning views of the Mediterranean Sea and is surrounded by gorgeous vegetation. Sharp angles in crisp white create a striking façade that conceals opulent internal spaces for a large family.

Geometric forms covered with a layer of water form a path to the front door at the north façade. From this angle, the home makes a forceful architectural statement. Walls are crossed and cut, and elements of the structure extend from the building project from the main structure, lending visual depth to the design. Angular white boxes define the bold exterior, which is clad in Roman transventilated travertine stone. Windows are an important feature of the home, drawing natural light into the corridors and common spaces, but are secondary to the aesthetic.

The footprint of the home is rectangular, organized to capture views and flow naturally between shared and discrete spaces. The most used spaces are located to the south, capturing the views and opening the public living spaces up to the expansive porch. The large black window that encloses the living space can be lowered automatically into the floor, eliminating any boundary between indoor and outdoor zones.

Inside the home, the spaces are wide and filled with natural light. The property is developed in three levels. The lower floor is dedicated to public spaces including the living room, kitchen, dining room, laundry and a small service room. The first floor is the most private space, housing bedrooms and a small office. On the ground floor, semi-private areas for relaxation offer a spa, the internal pool, a gym and a garage. The large central courtyards that articulate the property core provide light to this level of the home.

Generous private spaces and a range of functional rooms that are equally inviting, practical and handsome make this an ideal family home. Bold architectural decisions and attention to the smallest detail transforms what could simply be a large family home into an extravagant and exciting property.


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
