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
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WELCOME

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












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









INSPIRED IDEAS Lower-level fun












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When preparing a home for sale, the majority of our advice centers around neutralizing: decluttering, depersonalizing, and removing anything distracting. But it's important that in the effort to appeal to the masses, you aren't actually removing or replacing features that could positively contribute to a buyer's interest and perceived value. Here are some elements worth preserving, even if they seem outdated, personal, or unconventional. In many cases, these details could attract more buyers than a blank slate.

1. Original hardwood floors

Hardwood remains one of the most sought-after flooring materials. Even if you don't have the time or money to refinish the floors prior to selling, a few scuffs are rarely a deal breaker. Buyers generally understand that floors show wear. What matters more is the material. Wood, even with minor imperfections, is typically preferred over laminate or carpet and contributes to a sense of quality and longevity.

2. Architectural character like moldings and built-ins

Details like crown molding, arched doorways, built-in bookshelves, and vintage trim work may not align with every buyer's aesthetic, but they provide a custom feel. These features are often expensive to reproduce and difficult to find in new construction. While minimalism remains popular in staging, removing original design elements can erase the very character that makes a home memorable. Retaining them can help your property stand out.

3. Mature landscaping and established outdoor lifestyle features

Inexperienced sellers sometimes remove large trees, stone borders, or even perennial plants in an effort to simplify curb appeal. While overgrown landscaping may need pruning, mature trees and native plantings add perceived and actual value. And instead of completely emptying the yard, leaving lifestyle features like fire pits or hammocks can help suggest how an outdoor space could be used.

4. Statement lighting and non-builder fixtures

Some light fixtures can be too specific to personal taste, but swapping

everything out for builder-basic lighting can make a home feel flat or unfinished. Decorative pendants or mid-century sconces, if clean and functional, give rooms a sense of completion and quality. The goal isn't to appeal to every possible style preference, but to avoid a space that feels completely stripped down or generic.

5. Functional zones like mudrooms, utility sinks, or laundry nooks

Spaces that support daily life - like a designated mudroom area, garage utility sink, or laundry folding counter - might seem secondary, but they often influence how livable a home feels. Removing these for the sake of square footage or minimalism can be a mistake.

6. Natural materials with visible wear like wood, stone, or brick

Buyers increasingly value authenticity in finishes, even when that means visible aging or imperfections. Original slate floors or exposed brick can communicate craftsmanship and permanence. Replacing these with newer, lower-cost materials may not create the impact sellers hope for. Especially in older homes, the mismatch between old and new can be jarring. Instead of eliminating every sign of age, focus on maintenance and cleanliness.

Buyers aren't just evaluating square footage and upgrades. They are responding to the story your home tells. A too-blank slate can leave them struggling to imagine life there. Neutralizing is still useful. But it should be balanced with thoughtful preservation. Some elements can help buyers connect with a home, see its value, or picture their life more clearly, and that connection is what sells.
















Stunning new home features organic flow, designated spaces

For anyone in search of the latest and greatest in new home designs, it's always a good idea to frequent a luxury home showcase. Ideas and inspiration abound for attendees who trek through the custom homes featured in the show. Although with all the excitement, it's easy to forget that there are actual homeowners who take residence once the showcase ends.

In the case of this summer's Homearama in Dayton, the upscale and modern farmhouse-style home of Eric and Joy welcomed over 4,300 visitors and received overwhelmingly positive feedback (including, "Wow! You just want to sit down and grab a cup of cocoa or a glass of bourbon.")—and understandably so. Built by G.A. White Homes, the home exudes Old World charm and contemporary conveniences. Since it was the couple's third collaboration with G.A. White, they knew the company could deliver on their vision, which was a forever home that could easily accommodate frequent visits from their grown children and five grandchildren.

"We wanted a large area to host family, but at the same time we were looking for a more traditional architectural approach," explains Eric. "The open concept, where you walk into one giant space, is great but it's not conducive to lots of activities. No one room has its own function."


Accordingly, the couple challenged their architect to create spaces that feel open but that are nonetheless well defined, through features such as changing ceiling heights and the inclusion of half walls that create so-called "room portals."

"On our main floor, all rooms are separate, each with an intentional design," Eric adds. "We wanted it to be obvious to someone walking through the house what's what."

For its part, the expansive chef's kitchen boasts natural stone counters and custom cabinetry comprised of a warm hickory wood with an earthy morel stain. The cabinetry conceals the refrigerator and freezer, and the exquisite stone surrounds the stove. Builder Chad White explains: "It's a different spin on a kitchen. Even though it's not a traditional size or space, we were able to fit a lot of things in." There's a bar-beverage area, cooking area, dining area with more stone accents, unique butler's pantry, and more.

Both the kitchen and great room expand from indoors to outdoors, and the cathedral ceiling in the latter area gives the grand feel of a seamless indoor-outdoor resort-style "room." All doors on the main level provide access to the four-seasons outdoor living space, which was designed to be antislip and with aging in mind; therefore, there are no steps going out to the pool. Rather, G.A. White elevated the pool to meet the grade of the yard, with its lush landscaping, for a uniform look and feel.

"Our pool is right at the level of the house, which required some engineering," says Eric. "But it's awesome to walk out and sit down just as you would on a front porch."

"We created a really neat space," adds Chad, "and incorporated a putting green and cornhole, as well as fireplaces and televisions—everything you need to entertain outside."





Quiet time space

The primary suite also serves as a luxurious getaway, with two separate shower areas, towel warmers underneath each vanity, his-andher closets, a washer and dryer, and private office-writing room. Joy reflects on the spa-like space. "We wanted it to feel comfortable and be relaxed," she says, "And it even has a coffee bar and a bourbon bar so we can enjoy that first thing in the morning or later in the evening."




The primary bedroom opens to the backyard pool area.



Cheering the home team

Similar to the style in other parts of the home, the lowerlevel entertainment area is comprised of lots of "spaces" within the same "room." Chad explains: "No matter where you are in the basement, everyone is separate but still in the same area, whether you're at the bar, playing shuffleboard, in the banquette area, playing music, hanging out with the grandkids or cheering on the Buckeyes."

Speaking of, it's clear what the red "O" on the bar's ceiling stands for ("That's important to a lot of folks in these parts," says Eric, who admits the entire lower level is his favorite "room" in the home.) The couple recalls visiting many a sports bar and sitting in booths to watch Ohio State prior to when most games were available on television at home. Now they have their own "booth" in the tiled walls of the lower level, as well as a sunken theater, bourbon bar and space to play keyboards and guitars. "The whole entire lower level came from ideas we'd seen over the years," adds Eric.

"We designed this space and the entire home with the intent of how they live," concludes Chad. "It's set up for empty nesters, for entertaining and for their grandkids to visit. Everything is based on what will work for them now and for years to come."

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
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




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Full home remodel gives a license to start fresh

A home remodel isn't just about choosing the right colors and finishes; it's about transformation, both of space and of life. For someone recently widowed, a remodel can take on an entirely different meaning, as it's now reshaping a home into a sanctuary that supports a new phase of life.







From home to haven

This homeowner and her husband first moved to the Columbus suburb of Westerville to be closer to her daughter and grandchildren. But, when her husband passed shortly after deciding to remodel, the homeowner was faced with an entirely new challenge: what could her home look and feel like to represent this new chapter?



The home was originally built in 2022.





Designed for daily life

To guide her through the decision making and remodeling process, she partnered with Scott and Danette Veatch of Ron Scott Design Build. Their first step was to identify the things that would make the homeowner most comfortable in her reimagined space. "We recommend designing around a holistic concept," Scott explains. "We focused on creating a wellness- and familycentered design."


At 6'2", the homeowner knew she wanted a raised kitchen island she could use comfortably. The 42" island stands six inches taller than the average kitchen island, making everyday cooking feel more accessible. The rest of her kitchen counters stand at lower heights to account for guests and family members.

Once they were certain the updated kitchen would allow for comfortable use, Scott then got to work filling the space with other functional luxuries. This includes ample storage with soft-close doors, hidden outlets, and a breakfast nook, complete with tall, custom-made dining chairs.

The kitchen and living area open out to an all-season sunroom, which the homeowner says is now one of her favorite places. The space was intentionally designed to be used through all four seasons, with tinted windows that mitigate sunlight and UV during the summer, as well as heated floor tiles for winter use. It's the perfect place for the homeowner to dig into a good book and relax with her dogs.


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Hidden hobbies


The previous basement was half unfinished and felt disconnected. The renovation provided an opportunity for the homeowner to have more of her favorite things readily available to her. The finished basement now includes a dedicated storage space, an office, a sewing room, and, most notably, a swimming spa.

Swimming spas aren't commonly seen in the home, as it's difficult to contain the moisture and often leads to mold and mildew. But Scott wasn't deterred and instead sealed off the spa from the rest of the house, dehumidifying the space through negative pressure.

"Negative pressure is a separate ventilation system that sucks the air out of a given space," Scott explains. "The walls and the floor were sealed so the chemicals and moisture wouldn't migrate through the rest of the house."

But the impressiveness of the swimming spa doesn't end with the engineering feat: the spa includes accessible handrails both in the pool and above, an attached spout and hose, and a wave generator, which allows for regular swimming and aerobics.

The homeowner and her granddaughter love spending time in the swimming spa together, so the décor was infused with her granddaughter in mind. "It's her favorite place, so we made it bright for her," the homeowner explains. "The picture frames have lollipops in them, so it feels very kid friendly."





I Flooring leading to the swim spa was treated to resist moisture. 2 A wave generator in the spa provides resistance for swimming and aerobics.











Future planning

Many of the homeowner's decisions were made with the future in mind, especially a future that could come with unexpected difficulties. Given her husband's recent passing and her own battle with cancer, the homeowner understands that each day isn't guaranteed. "I wanted to make sure I could stay in my house for as long as possible," she explains. "If I was already renovating, it felt silly to not think of the things I might need in the future."

This meant accounting for accessible features that otherwise may not have been included, especially in the owner's suite and bathroom. The bathroom incorporates universal design principles, from ensuring wheelchair turn radius and a high-low sink, to enlarged shower doors, a walk-in tub, and ambient lighting. "It was important the space felt accessible without feeling medical," says Scott. "It has everything she might need to age comfortably but still feels cohesive with the rest of the design."

Beyond the blues

The color blue serves as a throughline throughout her home, bringing depth to different spaces while capturing the serenity the homeowner hopes to experience.

Danette is a true color expert, meaning she's certified in tailored color recommendations and color psychology. She took her keen understanding of color to support the homeowner through her grief journey. "I love the color blue, and Danette was able to find a shade of blue with violet undertones for my bedroom, which is known to help with grief and sorrow," says the homeowner. "It changed the tone of the whole house."

The new space represents everything the homeowner is: pragmatic, colorful, and full of character. She's thrilled with the final product and says it's a place where she feels truly happy. "It feels like my home now," she shares. "This is a place I can stay for years to come." 🔉

Hide and sleek











Take the stairs


One fun element was a welcome surprise this year. A fluted finish was discovered on a tub, range hood and fireplace surround adding texture and sleekness simultaneously.
